This puzzle 62 extra words make it fun to play.

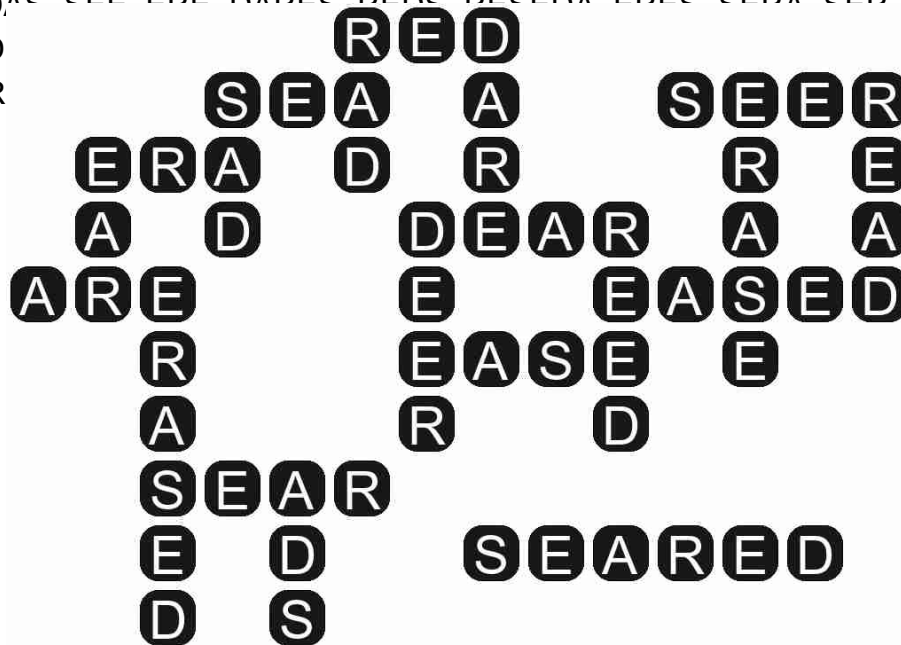
Reaching this point shows that you completed 35,983 words and 149,246 letters.

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# Word definitions - wordscapes level 3111

ADS - Plural form of ad.

ARE - Second-person singular simple present tense of be.

EAR - The organ of hearing, consisting of the pinna, auditory canal, eardrum, malleus , incus, stapes and cochlea.

ERA - A time period of indeterminate length, generally more than one year.

RED - Having red as its colour.

SAD - Sated, having had one's fill; satisfied, weary.

SEA - A large body of salty water. (Major seas are known as oceans.).

RAD - Excellent, short for radical.

DARE - To have enough courage (to do something).

DEAR - Loved; lovable.

DEER - A beast, usually a quadruped as opposed to birds, fish, etc.

EASE - The state of being comfortable or free from stress.

READ - A reading or an act of reading, especially an actor's part of a play.

REED - Any of various types of tall stiff perennial grass-like plants growing together in groups near water.

SEAR - Dry; withered, especially of vegetation.

SEER - Agent noun of see; one who sees something; an eyewitness.

EASED - Past participle of ease.

ERASE - To remove markings or information.

ERASED - Simple past tense and past participle of erase.

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
